#### Center Highlights:

August was the month for special events and outreach with community engagement! Naturalists supported the park district at three large events, including PorchRokr, Touch-A-Truck and Fall Hiking Spree Kickoff.

PorchRokr was an extremely busy event for the community, serving more than 600 visitors. Naturalists provided native tree activities, including an easy craft for little ones and nature trivia for the older crowd.

At Touch-A-Truck, we supported the autism-friendly hour by setting up a Build Your Park activity, complete with parkways, construction vehicles, and wildlife to visit! Naturalists entertained and educated more than 102 visitors during the event. At the Fall Hiking Spree Kickoff on Sunday, August 25, community engagement team members signed spree forms, answered visitor cultural and natural history questions about the site, assisted with unpacking and repacking the gift shop, and interpreted the life cycle of different caterpillars visitors may see out on the trail. We look forward to supporting this event again next year.

August was also a month filled with outreach programs throughout the county. Community Engagement was able to visit Stewart’s Caring Place, where children who have family members with cancer visited naturalists with live animals for the families to meet. They even helped to identify a non-venomous, uncommon snake in their building!

In addition to special events and outreach, naturalists also hosted recreation programs: kayaking, archery and camping. Camping has been extremely successful, despite what mother nature had in store for us! Over the course of the month, we had 80 visitors that were able to take part in camping activities such as cooking, campfires, night hikes and more!

### **What’s Next**

September will bring “something old and something new” for community engagement and park patrons! Under something old, we will continue the more than sixty year old Fall Hiking Spree tradition . We are also taking submissions for our annual Amateur Photography Exhibit. Patrons near and far have a chance to submit two of their finest Summit Metro Parks images to be selected. For something new, we are hosting a Children’s Art exhibit! Submissions will be accepted from September 1 through 22 for ages 5 – 18. Our newest submission program, Verdant Wonders, calls for nature and cultural literary writings. To learn more, attend “What is Verdant Wonders?” on September 12 at F.A. Seiberling Nature Realm.

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## **CONSERVATION DEPARTMENT**

- Free the Falls moves forward with our new podcast. The first episode aired in August and the second episode was recorded a week ago and will be released soon.
- Stream and fish surveys continue. This year, we are focusing on the Cuyahoga basin and our cool and cold-water tributaries.

- Park inventories continue.
- The coyote research project is gearing up and we are working to get two additional research animals under collar.
- The recent storms have begun to undermine the historic staircase at Cascade Valley. The conservation department will work with operations to enact repairs.
- Forestry projects aimed at controlling invasive trees will commence at Firestone, Munroe Falls, and Goodyear Heights Metro Parks in October.
- A stream restoration maintenance training was held on September 3 with operations and conservation departments in attendance.

**Volunteer Program:**

- In August, volunteers contributed 1,489 service hours.
  - Reoccurring volunteers (127) reported 1,336 hours within 26 assignments across the park district.
  - Episodic volunteers (48) helped to maintain garden beds and bioswales at Liberty Park Nature Center and the Valley View Area of Cascade Valley Metro Park as well as collected 516 pounds of trash and 22 tires from the Cuyahoga River.

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## MARKETING & COMMUNICATIONS

- **This September**, the Marketing & Communications department is focused on:
  - Planning and execution of fall events including the 61<sup>st</sup> Annual Fall Hiking Spree, Fall Family Outing and Truck-or-Treat, and
  - Preparations for our next Free the Falls public meeting (anticipated late October 2024) and upcoming communications announcing project updates and impending closures at Gorge Metro Park.
- **Media coverage** in August included Akron Life Magazine, Cleveland.com, Signal Akron, Akron Beacon Journal, WAKR, WCPN, WEWS-CLE (ABC), WKYC-CLE (NBC), WOIO (19 News), West Side Leader, Merced, The Times-Reporter, Yahoo! Lifestyle, The Independent and Farm and Dairy. Stories featured the influence of glaciers on native plants, replacing invasive plants with natives, area landmarks, Northeast Ohio's outdoor industry, an attack at the Valley View Area (Cascade Valley Metro Park) and related charges, Akron Tree Commission, a rare bird spotting in Ohio, peak fall colors, the Fall Hiking Spree, self-defense, fishing, Akron's ability to handle extreme rainfall events, park closures due to a storm, charges related to the false report at Silver Creek Metro Park, water recreation, the history of the Chuckery name, the history of Virginia Kendell Lake, PorchRokr and the arrest of a person connected to a shooting at Summit Lake.

- The **Fall Hiking Spree ad campaign** is underway and includes placements across the web, social media sites, streaming TV, various print publications, radio stations and select movie theater(s) in Summit County.
- **Maple Leaf Gifts** welcomed 1,311 visitors and processed more than \$15,400 in sales, an increase of more than \$2,000 over last year’s August sales. Best-selling items were T-shirts (including 283 Fall Hiking Spree shirts and 130 Pride shirts). Other top-sellers were jewelry, nature-based toys and books.
- The park district’s **new website is now live!** We have received great feedback about the site’s design and content. We will continue to develop and evolve the site to meet staff and visitor needs. In 2025, the website will include an online shopping option for Maple Leaf Gifts products.
- Marketing staff attended several **internal and external community events** in August, engaging more than 3,600 people, including:

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## OPERATIONS

### Park Areas and Structures

- SMP annual asphalt preservation program will continue through the fall. Crews have completed crack sealing areas for this year and are repainting parking lot lines and ADA parking spaces.
- Staff are working with the planning department to develop plans for the future central maintenance facility, Silver Creek and Munroe Falls Metro Parks master plans, asphalt paving, Sand Run retaining wall replacement, and Northampton Point River Access.
- Structural repairs to Goodyear’s Pioneer Shelter are scheduled to be completed once the materials come in. The plan is to replace the roof after the structural repairs are complete.

- Staff are working on installing ADA openers to the entry doors at the Administrative Offices and Summit Lake Nature Center. Doors and openers have been ordered and are expected to be installed this fall.
- The Administrative Offices' roof and HVAC replacement project is nearly complete. Contractors are waiting on materials for the HVAC screening to come in.
- Staff installed a new ADA stone path between the Tuscarawas Shelter and the restroom.
- Staff will be removing the old clock tower and volleyball court at Munroe Falls before the Fall Family Outing.
- The cottage and garage near Summit Lake Nature Center will be razed this fall.
- Portal signs for Firestone, Springfield Bog and Clinton will be replaced this fall/winter.

### **Trail Improvements**

- Staff installed interpretive signs at designated trailheads for the 2024 Fall Hiking Spree.
- Cascade Valley: Staff made repairs to Schumacher Trail from the parking lot to the first bridge. A new kiosk will be installed this month.
- Sand Run: A small section of Nuthatch Trail extension was rerouted to eliminate a more than 20-foot wooden pedestrian bridge and heavily eroded section of trail.
- Towpath: Crews will be replacing a section of wooden fence between Merriman Road and Weathervane Lane. Material was purchased with an Ohio and Erie Canal grant.
- Liberty Park: A 48" x 30' culvert on Buttonbush Trail will be replaced this summer.
- Firestone: The 48" x 30' culvert on Redwing Trail was replaced.
- Hampton Hills: Crews are repairing a section of Adam Run Trail that was damaged by erosion.
- Furnace Run: Crews will be working on Rock Creek Trail to stabilize sections of stream bank.

### **Park Activities & Events**

- Staff are preparing for the annual Fall Family Outing event at Munroe Falls that will be held on October 5. The public can enjoy free hayrides, bonfires, naturalist activities, music, apple cider, cookies, and lumberjack show. A wheelchair-accessible hay wagon is available.

- SMP will continue our partnership with the Akron Marathon that attracts more than 7,000 athletes and nearly 100,000 spectators to our area. Park staff provided race support for sections in our parks. The course uses the Towpath Trail from North Street to Portage Path and Sand Run Parkway. The Akron Marathon will be held on September 28.
- Cross-country season has begun, and our parks will be heavily used for practices and races. Races will be held at Silver Creek and Goodyear Heights throughout the fall. Participants include athletes from elementary schools to universities. Attendance for events ranges from 100 to 2,500+.
- Summit Metro Parks conducted an absolute online public auction of surplus equipment, tools, and materials August 17 – August 28, 2024. Items included landscaping equipment, power equipment, power tools, office equipment and various household items. The auction was conducted by Farnsworth Auctions LLC.

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## **PLANNING & DEVELOPMENT DEPARTMENT**

Below is a high-level summary and status update of the active park planning and development projects.

### **DESIGN, PLANNING AND STUDY PROJECTS:**

#### **District Wide**

##### ADA Transition Plan:

- ADA Consultant finished their initial facilities assessment and setting up spreadsheet of projects to review with staff.
- ADA Consultant is also reviewing upcoming projects to make sure we are meeting the most up-to-date standards.

Central Maintenance Facility:

- SMP Staff has been working with Richard L. Bowen and Associates to plan and design the renovations to the site and building SMP purchased on Broadway Avenue downtown to relocate our maintenance facilities and staff.
  - Construction documents for the site and building are to be completed this winter to start construction in 2025.

**Cascade Valley**

Towpath Trail Connector:

- Multi-purpose trail project to connect the current Valley Link Trail through the Valley View Area to the southern end of the park to the Ohio & Erie Canal Towpath Trail.
  - EMH&T is preparing background information to begin bridge options.

**Gorge**

Dam Removal:

- Sediment Disposal:
  - City of Akron is beginning work on the previous power plant site to begin removing the retaining walls and to get ready for the barge location.
  - Working with city of Akron to acquire lands for the sediment removal pipes.
  - Project is in the bidding phase; a contractor has not yet been selected by US EPA.
- Dam Structure Removal: This portion of the project is on hold until Sediment Disposal is substantially complete.
- Cuyahoga Falls Sanitary Sewer Replacement: The city of Akron has agreed to accept the city of Cuyahoga Falls sanitary flow into the North Side Interceptor Tunnel, redirecting 100% of the flow out of Gorge Metro Park. Design and coordination are ongoing.

**Munroe Falls**

Master Planning

- Master planning of Munroe Falls Metro Park is continuing. The plan, which is being guided by input from SMP staff and the public, will provide guidance for how the park is to be improved to better serve the public and environment into the future.
  - Staff are updating maps and plan to review with staff in September.

**Sand Run**

Retaining Walls and Railing Replacement

- Design and construction plans are complete, along with determining logistics and constructability.
  - Allen Stone Company has been provided with a contract. An additional survey has been done on the limits for construction; along with logistics of the Sand Run Parkway and Jogging Trail access during construction.

## **Goodyear Heights**

### Entry Drive and Parking Lot Improvements

- Design and construction plans are in progress to remove existing asphalt and curbs and improve ADA access to the Lodge and Restroom buildings. SMP will be applying for ODOT (OPRA) LPA funds to accommodate some of the costs.
  - Plans are being prepared to be bid this Fall/Winter for 2025 Construction

## **Trails**

### Bike & Hike Trail:

- SMP is partnering with Cleveland Metroparks, Cuyahoga Valley National Park and Sagamore Hills to create a trail extension between the Towpath Trail in Valley View to the Bike & Hike Trail in Sagamore Hills.
  - Working on agreements with partners to move project forward. Along with scope of work to begin design and engineering of this trail connector.

### Freedom Trail:

- Phase 4: Design is moving forward on the trail section from Mill Street to South Broadway Avenue. Coordination with the project stakeholders is ongoing. The goal is to bid for construction in late 2024.
  - We are coordinating with the city of Akron for improvements on the University Avenue Bridge to resolve conflicts and trail closures in the future. MOU with Akron is in the legislative approval process. Federal funds are allocated for both projects and coordination and approval have to be met by Akron Metropolitan Planning Study (AMATS) and Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT).

### Silver Creek Trail:

- The Silver Creek Trail is a proposed trail which would connect Silver Creek Metro Park in Norton to the Towpath Trail in Barberton.
  - First Energy has agreed to allow the trail on their property from Wadsworth to Barberton. Currently, working on scope of work for survey work to move the agreement forward.

## **CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS:**

### **Cascade Valley**

#### City of Akron North Side Interceptor Tunnel (NSIT):

- Construction work for Akron's North Side Interceptor Tunnel project is underway.
  - Excavation and installation on the overflow tunnel are proceeding.

### **Cuyahoga River Water Trail**

#### Northampton Point:

- Partnership project with Cuyahoga Valley National Park to build a parking lot, trailhead and access point on the Cuyahoga River Water Trail.

- All permits have been approved for construction. Pre-construction meeting was held on August 1 with construction to begin in October.

### **Freedom Trail**

#### Middlebury Road:

- A new connector trail which will connect the parking lot and trail to the Portage County Hike and Bike Trail. This consists of a new pedestrian/bicycle bridge over the CSX railroad tracks along with a trail.
  - This project has been awarded to J.D. Williamson Construction Company. Construction to begin on September 9.

### **Ohio & Erie Canal**

#### Towpath Trail:

- The bridge over the canal spillway near the Wolf Creek Trailhead is failing and in need of replacement. Grant money from Ohio & Erie Canalway Association will be used to help offset construction costs.
  - Bids were **received** on August 27 for construction of the bridge.

### **O'Neil Woods**

#### Entry Drive & Parking Lot Paving:

- As part of the Summit Countywide paving and striping program through the Summit County Engineers Office, Summit Metro Parks is repaving and striping the entry drive and parking lot at O'Neil Woods.
  - This project was awarded to Melway Paving Company and is complete. Additional work on berms and striping to be done in early fall.

**Sand Run**

East End Project:

- A portion of the roadway was removed and has been repurposed as an extension of the popular Jogging Trail. The project was completed in July 2024. Staff are beginning paperwork for grant reimbursement.

Administrative Office Roof & HVAC:

- Roof replacement and HVAC upgrades to the administrative office is taking place. This will alleviate the leaks in the roof and more efficiently provide heat/cool to the entire office. Drainage and front foyer upgrades will be part of the project.
  - Working with contractor to complete gutter installation, roofing panels and balance HVAC equipment.
